This book presents a systematic description and analysis of Romanian political life from the establishment of the Romanian national state in 1859 to the abdication crisis of 1871 that marked a turning point in the development of Romanian diplomatic history in the modern period has been well and extensively studied, both in Romania and elsewhere.
